Promoting health and hygiene



Nappy changing

Policy statement

No child is excluded from participating in our setting who may, for any reason, not yet be toilet trained and who may still be wearing nappies or equivalent. We work with parents towards toilet training, unless there are medical or other developmental reasons why this may not be appropriate at the time.

We make necessary adjustments to our bathroom provision and hygiene practice in order to accommodate children who are not yet toilet trained.

We see toilet training as a self-care skill that children have the opportunity to learn with the full support and non-judgemental concern of adults.

Procedures

- Young children from two years should wear ‘pull ups’ or other types of trainer pants as soon as they are comfortable with this and their parents agree.
- Any member of staff may be involved in changing young children
- Changing areas are warm and there are safe areas to lay young children if they need to have their bottoms cleaned.
- Each young child supplies their own bag with their own nappies or ‘pull ups’ and changing wipes, and a change of clothes

- Gloves and aprons are put on before changing starts and the areas are prepared. .
- All staff are familiar with the hygiene procedures and carry these out when changing nappies.
- In addition, all staff ensure that nappy changing is relaxed and a time to promote independence in young children.
- Young children are encouraged to take an interest in using the toilet; they may just want to sit on it and talk to a friend who is also using the toilet.
- They should be encouraged to wash their hands and have soap and towels to hand. They should be allowed time for some play as they explore the water and the soap.
- Staff are gentle when changing; they avoid pulling faces and making negative comment about 'nappy contents'.
- Staff do not make inappropriate comments about young children's genitals when changing their nappies
- Older children access the toilet when they have the need to and are encouraged to be independent.
- Nappies and 'pull ups' are disposed of hygienically. Any soil (faeces) in nappies or pull ups is flushed down the toilet and the nappy or pull up is bagged and put in the bin. Trainer pants and ordinary pants or any clothing that has been wet or soiled are bagged for the parent to take home.
- NB if young children are left in wet or soiled nappies/'pull ups' in the setting this may constitute neglect and will be a disciplinary matter.
- Settings have a 'duty of care' towards children's personal need.
